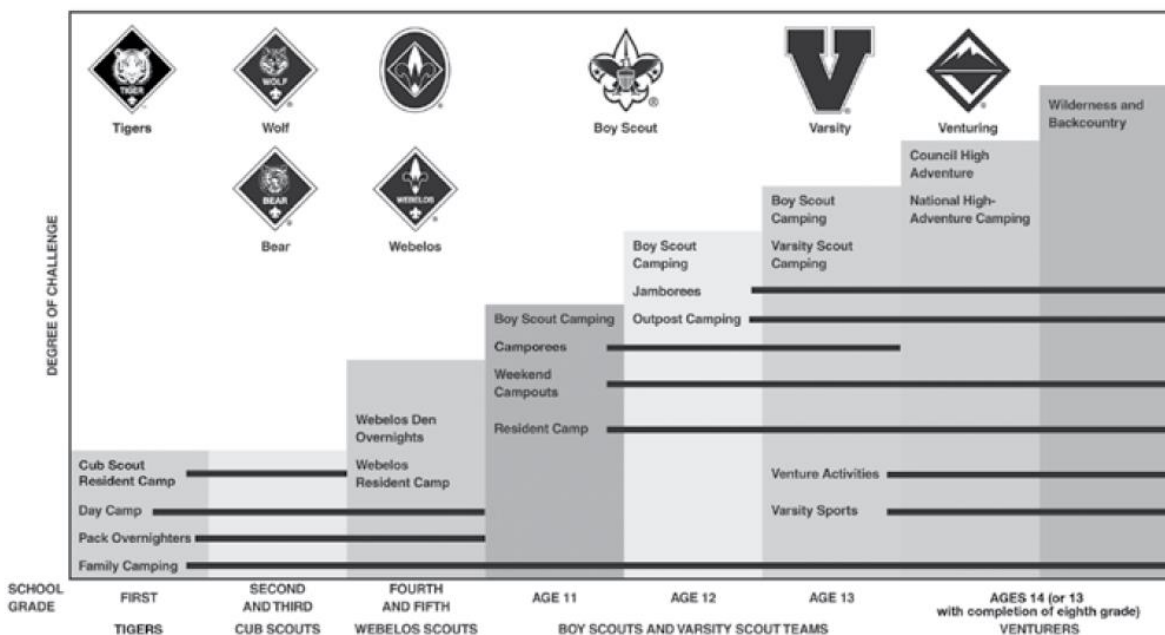


Can My Lion or Tiger Come to Resident Camp?

list them) are not listed under the overnight camping area. The Guide to Safe Scouting also states:

Age Guidelines

The Boy Scouts of America has established the following guidelines for its members' participation in camping activities:

- o Overnight camping by Tiger, Wolf, and Bear Cub Scout dens as dens is not approved, and certificates of liability insurance will not be provided by the Boy Scouts of America.
- o Tigers, with their adult partner, may participate in boy-parent excursions, day camps, pack overnights, council-organized family camping, or resident camping. (one to one ratio)
- o Tiger, Wolf, and Bear Cub Scouts, and Webelos Scouts may participate in a resident overnight camping program operating under BSA National Camping School-trained leadership and managed by the council.

At Camp Lassen, we currently don't have a defined activity for Lions or Tigers.

No Cub Left Behind: If the family has a special situation (the only way a Wolf → Webelo can attend is to have his sibling come), then we will make an exception (if there is space available in the session).

At Resident Camp, the days can be very long and jammed-packed, the little guys get wiped out. Lions and Tigers should focus on Twilight/Day camp and save Resident Camp as something they look forward to as Wolves, Bears and Webelos.
